The quaint countryside of Roero has a distinctive landscape, home to twenty small towns surrounded by Rocche (rocks). A flood created the Rocche, an extraordinary phenomenon of geological formations that created gullies, cliffs and deep ravines, giving a breathtaking view to everyone who visits the Nizza Silvano vineyards. In 2014, UNESCO recognized this region as a World Heritage Site.

For over 60 years, the Nizza family have been dedicated vine growers meticulously caring for their Arneis, Barbera and Nebbiolo grapes. The passion and practice of winemaking began with Sandro, Silvano's father, and his Uncle, Alfredo.

In the 2000s, Silvano started producing his own authentic wine, blending traditions passed down through generations with his creative innovation, always with the intention of expressing the unique qualities of the Roero terroir.

Silvano Nizza's remarkable skill in capturing the true essence of a wine and translating it into the wine glass makes him one of the most sophisticated wine producers in the Roero region of Italy's Piedmont Hills.

## The vineyard & terroir


Nizza Silvano's vineyards line the steep hillsides of Santo Stefano Roero, Canale and Montà. Situated between the lush green rolling hills of Langhe and the Monferrato.

Santo Stefano Roero is a subzone within the larger Roero wine region, featuring a landscape characterized by deep valleys and hillsides flourishing with vines, among them Nizza Silvano's vineyards. For generations, the family-run winery has poured their unwavering dedication and passion into cultivating their three grape varieties. Grapes are hand-picked with care from vines aged 15 to 70 years, illustrating a commitment to both tradition and quality. Their winery holds the SQNPI certification, a testament to their sustainable and environmentally responsible practices.

Situated a considerable distance from the sea and its moderating effects, the climate in the Roero hills is typically continental and notably dry, partly due to little rainfall. The agricultural terrain in this region is abundant in sand, clay, limestone, and humus, characteristics making it particularly fit for vine-growing.
